I give my master soft wool for his socks

To keep his feet warm in the cold.

Narr4 There were also two chickens that lived in the stable.

Polly & Peck We're the innkeeper's chickens called Polly and Peck.

We give him fresh eggs every day.

Some days they're scrambled, some days they're poached,

But boiled is his favourite way!

Narr 1234 (together) AND THEN THERE WAS THE RAT!

Rodney Hello. My name is Rodney the Rat,

I'm not important at all.

When people see me they normally scream,

And try to crawl up the wall.

My Daddy was caught by the Inn-keeper's broom,

My mum by the Inn-keeper's cat,

I have to be careful or I'll be the next,

For no-one has time for a rat.

He'll have to be careful or he'll be the next All Animals

For no-one has time for a rat!

(Animals turn their backs on Rodney and walk off)

NOW I AM A RAT. (CD tracks 1/10) SONG

Narr 5 Rodney the rat shuffled outside to sniff the evening air. The sky

> was clear and full of stars that sparkled like diamonds. But one star sparkled much brighter than all the others. Rodney looked

with amazement. It seemed as if it was smiling just at him.

Rodney Could a little rat like me

Cause anyone to smile?

When people see my ratty face

They usually run a mile!

Narr 6 The town was very busy that evening and many people were

knocking at the Inn-keeper's door, looking for somewhere to stay

for the night.

Guest 1 Knock! Knock! (Wooden block sound effect.)

Inn-keeper (Inn-keeper opens door.) Oh, good evening to you, Sir.

Guest 1 We're looking for a place to stay

> Where we may sleep and eat. Do you have a room at all Where we can rest our feet?

Inn-keeper Please come on in and be our guest.

That's why we're called 'The Travellers' Rest'.

Guest 2 Knock! Knock! (Wooden block sound effect.)

(Inn-keeper opens door.) Oh, good evening to you, Sir. Inn-keeper

Guest 2 Ah, my good man, this looks the place.

It's a cold and chilly night.

A room, a bed, some meat and bread

Would be a welcome sight!

Inn-keeper Please come on in and be our guest.

That's why we're called 'The Travellers' Rest'.

Guest 3 Knock! Knock! (Wooden block sound effect.) Inn-keeper (Inn-keeper opens door.) Oh, good evening to you, Sir.

Guest 3 The last place we stayed was full of rats

I hope this place is clean!

How much do you charge for a family room?

I hope you're not too mean.

Inn-keeper's wife (appearing from inside)

Of course we don't have rats, my man

We're clean and fit for a queen

Some rooms are cheap and some quite dear

And some are in between!

(The innkeeper ushers them inside)

Narr 8 Every time the Inn-keeper closed the door someone else would be

standing outside ready to knock. Soon all the rooms were full.

(The Inn-keeper holds up a board with all the rooms 1-10 written on it. He ticks each room as more sets of travellers arrive, then counts

his money.)

He looked very happy as he counted his takings.

Innkeeper Ten, twenty, thirty, forty, fifty, sixty, seventy, eighty, ninety, one

hundred pounds!

(The Inn-keeper looks to his wife)

Now we'll cook a great big meal

For all our guests to eat.

They're looking very hungry,

We'll charge ten pounds a seat!

Inn-keeper's wife Keep out of my way, I'll get it done

As fast as I am able.

If anyone else comes here tonight They'll have to use the stable!

Narr 8 The innkeeper and his wife set to work, peeling, chopping, and

boiling up meat and vegetables to make a tasty stew.

Narr 9 Rodney sniffed the air. The smell of food wafted up his nose and

made his tummy rumble with hunger. He slipped into the kitchen

when no-one was looking.

Rodney That food, it smells so good to me

I must get closer where I can see.

Narr 10 He climbed up onto a shelf and looked down. What a beautiful sight

met his eyes!

Narr 11 There was meat, fish, vegetables, nuts, currants, grapes, bananas,

pineapples and freshly baked bread. It all looked and smelt

wonderful to Rodney.

Rodney Can anything be as heavenly

As the sight I now can see?

I'll creep a little closer;

Will there be some for me?

Narr 12 In his excitement he crept forward, but as he did, the shelf gave

way. (Crashing cymbals.)

It crashed down onto the table full of food, closely followed by

Rodney.

A RAT! I THINK I SAW A RAT. (CD tracks 2/11) SONG

> (During the song the Inn-keeper's wife picks up a broom and chases Rodney around the kitchen and on into the dining room where all the guests are waiting for dinner. Some guests scream,

some stand on chairs, some faint with fright.)

Narr 13 Rodney's little heart was beating faster than ever as he squeezed himself under the front door and then tumbled down the front steps

onto the road right into the path of a young couple who were making

for the inn.

Narr 14 Rodney looked up into the face of the young woman. She looked

very tired and had a large round tummy. But he didn't stop; he continued to run as fast as he could down the road and on into the

open fields that surrounded the town.

Narr 15 Poor Rodney collapsed with exhaustion; he had hurt his leg badly on the steps. As he sat in the grass licking his wounds he noticed

the big bright new star shining down on him again and wondered

why it shone so brightly – and was it smiling at him again?

SONG **STARLIGHT WHY DO YOU SHINE SO BRIGHTLY?** (CD tracks 3/12)

Narr 16 Meanwhile back at 'The Travellers Rest' all the guests had retired to their rooms. The Inn-keeper was just about to turn out the lights

when there was another knock at the door.

Knock! Knock! (Wooden block sound effect)
