# **SCRIPT** THE LITTLE FIR TREE

(For the opening scene, the little fir tree stands in the centre of the stage while the tall trees stand behind him in a semi circle. If you have a local forest or wood that is familiar to your school, the setting of the play could be made more personal. The first line could read; 'In the middle of the Forest of Dean / New Forest grew some fir trees...)

- Narrator 1: In the middle of a deep forest grew some fir trees.
- Narrator 2: They grew tall and straight and stretched their branches high towards the sky.
- Narrator 3: But there was one tree that was much smaller than the others and seemed to grow much more slowly. This made the smallest tree rather sad.
- Little tree: I really wish that I could grow High up into the sky. But I just seem to stay quite small No matter how I try.
- Narrator 4: The woodcutter came round to look at the trees.
- Woodcutter: Don't give up now, little tree Just because you're small. Send your roots deep into the ground And you will grow quite tall.
- Narrator 5: So the little tree sent down his roots and held his head up proudly.
- Narrator 6: Children from the village often come to play in the forest.
- Narrator 7: They swang on the branches and chased each other through the trees. It was their favourite place to play.
- SONG 1: CHILDREN ARE YOU READY TO PLAY

(Some children run and play in and out of the trees during this song)

Narrator 8: Sometimes the rain came to the forest. It fell on the trees and they grew strong.

## SONG 2: SPLISH SPLASH PITTER PATTER

(Children perform appropriate dance routine dressed as rain drops.)

Narrator 9: Sometimes the sun shone on the forest. It warmed the trees and they reached towards the sun and grew tall.

#### SONG 3: SUNLIGHT

(One child performes appropriate dance routine dressed as the sun.)

Narrator 10: Sometimes the snow fell. The flakes fluttered on the trees and they grew strong in the cold wind.

### SONG 4: SEE THE SNOWFLAKES

(Children perform appropriate dance routine dressed as snowflakes.)

- Narrator 11: As the months passed, the forest trees grew strong and tall, but still the little fir tree did not grow very big. Some of the other trees laughed at him.
- Tree 1: Hello Shortie
- Tree 2: Hello Tiny
- Tree 3: Hello Squirt
- Narrator 12: One day the woodcutter came around again. He marked the trees with a large cross. All except the smallest tree.
- Woodcutter: Please don't worry Little green tree. I have a very special job for you. Just you wait and see
- Tree 1: I am tall and very strong What shall I be one day? A mast on a beautiful sailing ship That's what I'll be one day.
- Tree 2: I am tall and very strong What shall I be one day? A telegraph pole with wires across. That's what I'll be one day.
- Tree 3: I am tall and very strong What shall I be one day? A pole with a king's flag flying on top That's what I'll be one day.
- Tree 1,2,3: You are short and not very strong. What will you be one day? You're too small to be any good. That's what WE all say!
- Narrator 13 By and by the woodcutter came and chopped the large trees down. They were put on a big lorry and driven away.
- Narrator 14: Now the small tree was left on his own and he felt lonely and sad, for nobody wanted him.
- Little tree: I am short and not very strong What will I be one day? I'm much too small to be any good That's what - all say.
- **SONG 5: ALL ALONE** (*Little fir tree sings solo.*)

Narrator 15:	Two big tears rolled from the little tree. Not even his friends, the forest creatures, could cheer him up.		
Fox:	Hello, little fir tree Please do not be sad I'll snuggle close and be friends with you And that will make you glad.		
Owl:	Hello, little fir tree. Please do not be sad. No one's too small to be any good Remember that and be glad.		
Squirrel:	Hello, little fir tree Please do not be sad. I will sing a song for you And that will make you glad.		
Rabbit:	Hello, little fir tree. Please do not be sad. I will do a dance for you And that will make you glad.		
SONG 6:	YOU ARE A SPECIAL TREE (Animals perform appropriate dance routine.)		
Narrator 16:	But the little tree was not to be comforted, and eventually the forest creatures tiptoed quietly away and left him in peace.		
Narrator 17:	Then he gave himself a good shake and tried to be brave, for he saw the woodcutter coming.		
Narrator 18:	The woodcutter chopped the little tree down and carried him away.		
Narrator 19:	The woodcutter took the little fir tree to a very large building.		
Narrator 20:	He stood him up in a corner of a room.		
Woodcutter:	Please don't worry Little green tree. This is the special job for you, Just you wait and see.		
Narrator 21:	Some people came in and began to hang shiny coloured balls and strands of pretty tinsel on him, and a glittering star at the top.		
Narrator 22:	How beautiful I look! I wish the other trees could see me now, thought the little tree, and he wondered where he was.		
Little tree:	I look very wonderful I feel just like a king. Am I in a rich man's castle Or a palace for a queen.
